Keynote Speaker: Dr. Maureen Lovett

Senior Scientist in the Brain and Behaviour Program of



the Hospital for Sick Children, Dr Lovett is a Professor of Pediatrics and Psychology at the University of Toronto. She is the founder and director of the hospital's Learning Disabilities Research Program, a clinical research unit dedicated to developing and evaluating different forms of remediation for children with developmental reading disabilities.

The results of two decades of research at The Hospital For Sick Children on what constitutes effective remediation for severely reading disabled children will be outlined in this presentation.

The focus will be on understanding why reading disabled children often fail to acquire basic word identification, decoding, and reading comprehension skills, and what can be done to teach them. Phonological, metacognitive, and combined approaches to word identification and reading comprehension programming will be described and evaluated. Results from intervention research with more than 1600 reading disabled children will be summarized, and implications of the results discussed with respect to optimizing outcomes for individual children in remedial and classroom settings.
